

Horden Parish Council Annual Report 2017/18

Message from the Chairman, Councillor Isabel Roberts

First and foremost, I would like to welcome Parish Councillors Ian Mclean, William Morrow, Frank Leadbitter, Laurence Williams, Jamie Robinson and Alison Lodge who were elected retrospectively in May and August 2017. Some of these Councillors replace four of our long serving Councillors Mary Clark, William Hill, Derek Nicol and Jean White who sadly passed away.

This last year has been an honour for me to have been elected as Chairman of Horden Parish Council. Together Parish and County Councillors have worked hard to raise the profile of our village. An example being the



Numbered Streets clean-up, a multitude of agencies joined forces including Horden Parish Council, Durham County Council, Horden Colliery Residents Association, Durham Police and County Durham & Darlington Fire Brigade, this was a true example of team work in action. Horden Parish Council are supporting the clean-up efforts into 2018/19.

In July 2017 I held a fundraising evening through my sons charity, the evening raised \pounds 1,500, the proceeds of which were donated to Horden Colliery Welfare Football Club. I also hosted a Chairman's Charity Evening in November 2017 and raised \pounds 700. \pounds 350 was donated to North East Air Ambulance Service and \pounds 350 to Peterlee Women's Refuge. Many thanks to all the local businesses for their continued support in donations. I have also donated to Horden Bowls Club, the Royal Signals and Horden Banner Committee through my Chairman's Allowance.

In November I attended the Licensing of St. Mary's Church's new Priest, Reverend Kyle McNeil, welcoming Father McNeil to Horden and Blackhall Churches. In April 2018 I officially opened the new shop Bluebells, situated in the old Doctors Surgery in Twelfth Street.

I officially opened a Memorial Bench at Jack Dormand Care Home in memory of Councillor Billy Hill and in memory of our long serving Councillors, Horden Parish Council dedicated a picnic bench in the Welfare Park, in memory of Councillor Jean White and named a room in Horden Social Welfare Centre the "Mary Clark Room". Both Jean and Mary served the residents of Horden in their capacity as Councillor and volunteer for many, many years.

In 2017/18 Horden Parish Council sponsored a seat in the Miners' Hall, Durham (Redhills) better known as the 'Pitman's Parliament'. The Pitman's Parliament is a unique place, for almost a century it was the scene of many important debates which shaped the lives of our mining communities. It was only apt that Horden Parish Council sponsored Horden's Seat, Number 145. The sponsorship money raised will contribute to the restoration and development of Redhills.

In July, all of Horden's schools took part in the parish council's annual painting competition, Horden in Bloom. I attended the schools to award the winning children with their prizes. Well done to all who participated, the judging gets harder ever year! The Summer Events went without a hitch and were just as popular as always. Thanks go to County Councillors June Clark and Ian Mclean for contributing a very generous donation of $\pounds 2,890$ towards our summer events budget. With the County Councillors donation and $\pounds 3,000$ Parish Council Budget we were able to provide several events throughout every week of the school holidays.

Once again thanks go to everyone who attended the Remembrance Sunday Parade back in November and the Christmas Tree Lighting Service held in December, both events were well attended and help to maintain our long standing village traditions. Special thanks to the Salvation Army Band and local school children who came together to sing Christmas Carols and light the tree, it was a huge success.

The Thorpe Road Cemetery extension is now underway, you may have noticed the new boundary fencing. Groundwork is expected to start in May 2018, you can read about the proposed schedule of work in detail further in the report.

Durham County Council's plans continue to progress for Horden's Railway Station. Many residents attended the consultation event to view the proposed plans, I think we can all agree the station will be a great asset to Horden and look forward to the development starting. A big thank you must got to Durham County Council and all agencies involved for their tireless campaign to make this happen.

I have taken my role as Chairman very seriously and the Parish Council will continue to serve the people of Horden and together we can achieve the impossible. We are hoping for another successful year here at the Parish Council, and of course we could not provide the services we do without the support of the staff so a big thank you to all of the Parish Council staff!

Introduction

Welcome to the 2017/18 Annual Report, this is our website. Any registered elector of the Parish the full report of the Parish Council; a summary will be published in the next Parish Council a reasonable cost; these can only be obtained Newsletter.

This report has been produced and made available prior to the Annual Assembly to be held on Wednesday 9th May 2018 at 6pm in the Social Welfare Centre. The Annual Assembly is a meeting of the electors of the Parish of Horden and **<u>1. Welfare Park</u>** provides an opportunity for residents to discuss the information provided and to question the Council on its activities during the year. Any resident of the village is welcome to attend this meeting.

Horden Parish Council serves the village of Horden including Grants Houses, with a population of around 5,778 residents.

We deliver many services in the village, such as the provision of parks, playing fields and recreation areas; we run the Thorpe Road Cemetery, have responsibility for the Station Road Allotments and run the Social Welfare Centre.

Our aim is to give residents information about the Parish Council and the services which we deliver in the village, to outline how we are dealing with current challenges and highlight our plans to meet community needs and deliver quality services in the next year and beyond.

Horden Parish Council is one of around 10,000 Parish & Town Councils within England, Parish and Town Councils are the first tier of local government and work closely with the other tiers of local government to try to achieve the best for their local communities. During the year we have worked closely with Durham County Council on a number of issues, two of your Parish Councillors, June Clark and Ian Mclean, are also County Councillors for Durham County Council.

Meetings of the Parish Council are normally held the first Thursday of each month (except August) starting at 6pm in the Social Welfare Centre. The Agenda for Council meetings is prepared on the Horden clubs including the Bowls, Cricket and Friday prior to the meeting and displayed on the Football continue to licence the sports pitches and Parish Council Noticeboard in the foyer of the Social Welfare Centre and also on our website for the public to view.

All meetings of the Parish Council are open to the public (although some items of business may be heard in private session). If you wish to attend the meeting, just turn up.

The Council are happy for the public to give their views or comments during Public Participation, but ask that you notify the Clerk prior to the meeting of the topic on which you wish to speak. If you would like further information, please contact Paul Davison during office hours.

Minutes of meetings are available for public inspection at the Social Welfare Centre and are on is entitled by law to have copies of the minutes for with advance notice from the Parish Council Offices at the Social Welfare Centre.

REVIEW OF 2017/18

The park was awarded a Green Flag and Green Heritage Site status in August for the eleventh consecutive year.

The park once again had a number of events and activities taking place during school holidays. Many have enjoyed the various events and performances that took place during the year. Details are always posted in the noticeboards at the entrances to the park and on the Parish Council's website and facebook page.

The Welfare Park play areas benefitted from the addition of seven new pieces of play equipment including a new roundabout, springers, music pipe play panel, spica and climbing somersault, at a total Net cost of £9670.72.

The park was subjected to numerous acts of vandalism over 2017/18, which resulted in a total of four pieces of play equipment being removed, because they could not be repaired. To maintain the facilities the park offers the seven new pieces of equipment were installed in early March.

In response to the acts of vandalism and antisocial behaviour taking place in the park a wireless CCTV system was installed in December 2017. There are a total of nine cameras to assist the detection of crime, reduce the fear of crime and improve public and staff protection.

The CCTV recordings will not be used to invade the privacy of any individual but only to aid a safe and secure environment to those who visit or work in the park.

The Vintage Tea Rooms and Heritage Centre, ran ly with many of Mary's family, friends and colby volunteers, continue to be a popular attraction leagues in attendance. in the park. The Tea Room and Heritage Centre are open every Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10:30am - 3pm in the months of March -October.

During 2017/18 major work in the park has included new UPVC windows and doors in the Ambulance House, fitting of a new roller shutter on the cricket storage building, CCTV installation, 3. Thorpe Road Cemetery new play equipment and a security alarm system in the works compound building.

Horden Parish Council Park staff have consistently delivered a service second to none in their maintenance of the park and sporting facilities. The dedication and commitment to excellence ensure that users of the Welfare Park continue to enjoy the amenities at the quality they expect. A special thank you go to all of the staff for their efforts.

2. Social Welfare Centre

The Social Welfare Centre continues to be used by many residents and community groups. Activities space is available, consider donations of seats, range from Brownies to Slimming Clubs on weekdays, whilst the building is used for functions and If you wish to find out more about the cemetery parties at weekends.

Plans for the expansion to the north of the existing cemetery continued in 2017.

3.6 acres of land was purchased by the parish council in 2017 from local farmers and work continued throughout the year.

Archaeological work involved the digging of 8 trenches to determine if the site held any historical significance in the summer of 2017 in order to meet planning conditions from Durham County Council. Although the process was quite interesting, no artefacts were found unfortunately!

Site investigations from Durham County Council's Highways Department and the council's cemeterv development contractor also took place this year in order to look at reducing the periodic water issue that the cemetery is subject to in periods of heavy rain, in conjunction with the previously approved drainage scheme to be carried out which will help reduce water pooling in the existing cemetery.

The extension of the cemetery is the largest ongoing project that the parish council has identified over the last few years and one which requires significant investment to deliver.

A loan was secured from the Public Works Loan Board in 2017 for £500,000 which will be repaid using the council tax that was previously increased to already take into account loan repayments.

Part of the work to be carried out in 2018 is to address the periodic water pooling issue to the east part of the cemetery on the path during periods of heavy rain. The parish council have acknowledged that this is a historical problem that Part of the income that the cemetery generates is should have been addressed when the cemetery an annual financial contribution invoiced to Peterwas planned in 1952 and throughout the intervening years as rainfall has steadily increased, the tribution was paid by the Town Council to alleviate pooling issue has worsened over time.

Durham County Council surveyed their roadside rain gully system in 2017 on Thorpe Road and conducted work to try and alleviate the amount of rain running down the bankside into the cemetery with only limited success.

Due to the location of burial plots in the existing cemetery it is not possible to lay new drainage to alleviate the issue, however an existing water sump which becomes completely filled with runoff water during heavy rainfall will be connected to new drainage which will run downhill to the north into the new extension and discharge into a wetland area to the west of the extension which is not suitable for burials. It is hoped that this measure will reduce the water pooling in the existing cemetery.

Financial Cemetery Contributions

Horden Parish Council are the statutory burial authority for the village. As such they maintain the cemetery at Thorpe Road in order to keep it to a good standard and condition. This of course, has a significant cost element attached to it which is addressed partially with cemetery fees and charges, but mainly via the precept (council tax) raised with Horden residents. The forecast expenditure for the cemetery in 2018 is £110,681.

This conthe financial pressure on Horden taxpaying residents as a significant part of the cemetery holds Peterlee residents buried there before the Town Council built their own cemetery in 1992 and it is Horden taxpayer's who pay for the cost of maintaining the cemetery, mainly.

The contribution the Town Council paid was for the "use" of Horden's cemetery and costs of ongoing cemetery maintenance from 1952-1992, a span of forty years before Peterlee residents had the choice of being buried in their own community. The impact of this practice has meant that over time, the existing cemetery at Thorpe Road has filled guicker (and has already been extended once in the 1990's) and has now had to be extended again, at a cost to the Horden taxpayer.

In 1992, a financial contribution was agreed which would increase over time with annual inflation. Peterlee Town Council have contributed every year when they were invoiced by Horden Parish Council. In 2017, the annual contribution invoiced was set at £8,343.

However, when the contribution was requested again for, Peterlee Town Council considered the matter on 9th October 2017 and resolved not to make any further contributions from 2017 onwards.

Horden Parish Council note with extreme dismay, 5. Church Green Peterlee Town Council's position on the matter. They unequivocally disagree with the Town Council refusing to honour their historical obligation to contribute to the maintenance of their residents graves for the forty years that the town did not provide for them. This obligation must now unjustly fall to the Horden taxpayer to fund that contribution for the ongoing maintenance of an- 6. Sunderland Road Playing Fields & other community's graves.

The Parish Council noted that Peterlee Town Council did resolve to lessen the impact of their decision to try and arrange a meeting with Horden Parish Council to further discuss mitigating their decision in early 2018.

Horden Parish Council have taken the firm view that either Peterlee Town Council will stand by their obligations or they will not; the Parish Council have taken the view that the debt still stands activities such as five-a-side football, permanent and refuse to write the debt off.

The Town Council were informed that no meeting small play area for children. was required to discuss the mitigation of the impact of Peterlee Town Council's resolution, when the rightful measure to mitigate the impact of the decision was to acknowledge the obligation owed and pay the invoice issued.

No further comment from Peterlee Town Council was issued on the matter.

4. Memorial Park

2017/18 has been one of general ongoing maintenance at Memorial Park.

As is the tradition within the village, the Remembrance Sunday Service took place in the park in 2017. Remembrance Sunday hosted not one, but three buglers from the Buglers Association of the Light Division and Rifles, and what a sterling job they did.

The December Christmas Tree Lighting Service was well attended and supported admirably by Horden Salvation Army Band for the Carol Service.



Many residents attended these two events which have become regulars in the Parish Council Calendar.

Church Green is the area of grass at the bottom of the Memorial Park opposite St Mary's Church. It has a number of seats litter and dog bins. This area is registered by the Parish Council as a village green back in 2014, protecting the green from future development.

Play Area

Many football teams continue to be allocated pitch space at Sunderland Road. Currently there are 6 teams playing on the pitches.

Whippet racing also takes place on the fields on a Saturday morning, an activity which has a long tradition within the village.

In 2017/18 there were a number of summer events on the playing fields, funded by both Horden's County Councillors Neighbourhood Budget, all events were very well received by those living locally.

Development continues on the Sports Pavilion/ Changing Rooms with the new pitched roof work due to start in May 2018.

7. Station Road Allotments

The allotments, situated at the end of Acacia Avenue, are on both sides of the railway bridge. Some of the site is rented by the Parish Council from Castle Eden Estates, the remaining part of the site belongs to the Parish Council. The whole site is rented to the Station Road Allotments Association who manage the site including collection of rents and run the "Garden Hut".

8. Cotsford Park Play Area

The area in the centre of the inner ring of houses at Cotsford Park is a registered village green for which the Parish Council has management responsibility.

A number of summer events were held in the play area throughout the 2017/18 school holidays. The events were funded by both Horden's County Councillors Neighbourhood Budget and delivered by Creative Youth Opportunities.

We received fantastic feedback from all who attended and the events were very much welcomed by those living locally.

<u>9. Maritime Crescent Play Area,</u> <u>Grants Houses</u>

The land at Maritime Crescent is in the ownership of Durham County Council, with the mini goals and play equipment belonging to Horden Parish Council. A number of summer events were held in the play area throughout the 2017/18 school holidays. The events were funded by County Councillor's Neighbourhood Budget and delivered by Creative Youth Opportunities.

10. Planning Applications

The Parish Council are statutory consultees on all planning applications submitted to Durham County Council. This means that the Parish Council have the opportunity to support or object against an applications submitted from within the village. During 2017/18 there were 16 applications considered by the Parish Council.

11. Grants

The Parish Council give many grants and donations to local groups and charitable organisations during the year. Some of the grants are in the form of free or reduced rental use of Parish Council facilities, particularly the Social Welfare Centre. Other grants are in the form of monetary donations. All requests for grants are considered by the Finance & General Purposes Committee. Listed below are the organisations who have received financial assistance in 2017/18:

12. Publicity & Communications

Each year we produce a financial information leaflet that is sent on our behalf to each household by Durham County Council with the Council Tax demand. This leaflet details the amount we intend to spend delivering services within the parish and the amount we collect from the Council Tax.

In addition we also publish quarterly newsletters each year which are distributed throughout Horden.

Events and activities organised by the Council are advertised in the noticeboards at the Welfare Park, the Social Welfare Centre, locally and via the Parish Council's Website and Social Media. If any residents are interested in submitting information of interest to others in the village for inclusion in the newsletter, please contact the Clerk.

13. Partnership Working

In order to achieve more in the village the Parish Council works in partnership with others. This year those with whom partnerships have been formed include Durham County Council, Horden Regeneration Partnership, Heritage Coast, residents groups, sporting organisations and various community groups. If you think that we could achieve more by working with your group or organisation please contact the Clerk to the Council.

14. Finance and Funding

2017/18 During the Council set a budget of £699,514. It is estimatthat spent ed we £784,955 during the year, which includes some expenditure from earmarked reserves on capital projects



Our external auditors, Mazars, have set the audit date for the 2017/18 accounts as 6th July 2018. By law, any interested person has the right to inspect the Council's accounts. Any registered elector also has the right to ask questions about the accounts or challenge an item of account within them. The accounts will be available for public inspection for 30 working days from 2nd July 2018. If you wish to exercise your right to inspect the accounts, please contact the Clerk to the Council, Paul Davison between the hours of 10am and 3pm on any of those dates stated.

In 2017/18 the Parish Council received funding from Durham County Councillors Neighbourhood Budget Fund for the following projects:

15. The Year Ahead

Major projects planned in 2018/19 will include the completion of Thorpe Road Cemetery extension, a major review of the Parish Council's asset base with all properties surveyed, the refurbishment of the War Memorial at Memorial Park and a new pitched roof development at Sunderland Road Pavilion.

15. Strategic Plan

In December 2017, the Council continued a formal process of planning for the year ahead. Much has been achieved in the past five years and the Council wish to continue to improve services whilst concentrating on keeping increases to a minimum.
