  - the Annual Governance and Accountability Return Sections 1, 2 and 3, together with
  - a bank reconciliation as at 31 March 2018
  - an explanation of any significant year on year variances in the accounting statements
  - · your notification of the commencement date of the period for the exercise of public rights

Unless requested, do not send any original records to your external auditor. Your external auditor will ask for any additional documents needed.

Once the external auditor has completed and is able to give an opinion on the limited assurance review, the Annual Governance and Accountability Return including Section 3 – External Auditor Report and Certificate will be returned to the authority.

#### **Publication Requirements**

Smaller authorities with either income or expenditure exceeding £25,000 must publish on a public website, under the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015, the Annual Governance and Accountability Return:

- Section 1 Annual Governance Statement 2017/18, page 4
- Section 2 Accounting Statements 2017/18, page 5
- Section 3 The External Auditor Report and Certificate 2017/18, page 6
- Notice of the period for the exercise of public rights and other information required by Regulation 15 (2), Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015.

It is recommended as best practice, to avoid any potential confusion by local electors and interested parties, that you also publish the Annual Internal Audit Report, page 3.

The Annual Governance and Accountability Return constitutes the annual return referred to in the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015. Throughout, the words 'external auditor' have the same meaning as the words 'local auditor' in the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015.

### Guidance notes on completing Part 3 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return 2017/18

- The authority must comply with Proper Practices in completing Sections 1 and 2 of this Annual Governance and Accountability Return. Proper Practices are found in the Practitioners' Guide\* which is updated from time to time and contains everything needed to prepare successfully for the financial year-end and the subsequent work by the external auditor.
- Make sure that the Annual Governance and Accountability Return is complete (i.e. no empty highlighted boxes), and is properly signed and dated. - The Responsible Financial Officer (RFO), on behalf of the authority, must set the commencement date for the
  exercise of public rights. From the commencement date for a single period of 30 consecutive working days, the

  inspection period during which the accounts and accounting records of all smaller authorities must be available
  for public inspection of the first ten working days of July.



#### INTRODUCTION

#### This page is part of Section 3 – External auditor report 2017/18

The following matters have been raised to draw items to the attention of Horden Parish Council. These matters came to the attention of Mazars LLP during the review of the Annual Governance and Accountability Report (AGAR) for the year ended 31 March 2018. This report must be presented alongside the AGAR to a full meeting of the smaller authority for review.

The review of the annual return may not disclose all shortcomings of the systems as some matters may not have come to the attention of the auditor. For this reason, the matters raised may not be the only ones that exist.

Except for the matters reported below on the basis of our review of the annual return, in our opinion the information in the annual return is in accordance with proper practices and no other matters have come to our attention giving cause for concern that relevant legislative and regulatory requirements have not been met.

The Council has not fully implemented recommendations made in the 2016/17 External audit report regarding accounting for trust funds. The Council answered "yes" to the relevant assertion in the 2017/18 Annual Governance Statement claiming it had taken appropriate action in respect of audit reports. In future, the Council should ensure that appropriate action in response to audit recommendations is taken within a reasonable time.

The Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) continues to include transactions and balances held on behalf of a registered charity in boxes 3 and 6. The AGAR has therefore not been prepared in accordance with the guidance in The Accounts and Audit (England) Regulations 2015. In future, the Council should ensure that the charities income and expenditure are processed through its own bank account and not reflected in the AGAR.

The Council asserted in assertion 9 of the Annual Governance Statement that it discharged its responsibilities as a trustee but acknowledged in a covering letter that the answer should have been no due to the transactions being processed through the Council's bank account. In future, the Council should ensure that it discharges its duties as sole trustees and answers no to assertion 9 where this has not been possible.

Other matters not affecting our opinion which we draw to the attention of the smaller authority:
